GRAND KNIGHT'S MESSAGE




Dear Brothers and Sir Knights:

Father Ernie Deslippe (1929 - 2011) served as Council chaplain for over 46 years. He was born in Harrow Ontario on March 20, 1929 and was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop John C. Cody on May 27, 1961 at St. Peter's Basilica, London Ontario. He celebrated his first Mass at St. Anthony of Padua parish in Harrow. Through his 50 years of ordained ministry, he served as associate pastor, Holy Angels' Parish, St. Thomas; and Administrator, St. Joseph Mission, Port Stanley. He was an inspiring priest, a leader with fortitude. Throughout his life he was a comforting power for disadvantaged people helping them to find a clear path to follow. He was a dedicated member of the Knights of Columbus who stressed that prayer is a vital tool. It helps to become confident, to see things in proper perspective, to give us vision, courage, strength and endurance, and to erode our impure motives.

He said holiness is not something we do for ourselves and instead something that God does in us. He invited us to open our hands to allow what we have to be shared, to flow out of us and we watch it multiplied. He understood that giving, not getting, is the generosity begets generosity. He pointed out that paying attention is one of the greatest compliments we can pay to another human being. Father Deslippe exemplified the mission of the Church to guide its followers to a fulfilling life. He was a great spiritual leader dedicated to prayer and always striving for virtue. Fr. Ernie was a strong advocate of learning and so Council awards a \$1000 scholarship in his name each year to a student that demonstrates the values and principles of the Gospel and is pursuing post-secondary education.

The Knights of Columbus (K of C) is a fraternal benefit society that was established in 1882 thanks to the efforts of **Blessed Father Michael J. McGivney**, assistant pastor of St. Mary's Church in New Haven, Connecticut. The K of C has grown from several members in one council to more than 14,000 councils and approaching 2 million members worldwide. 



Did you know that New Year's Day, January 1st, was, from 1568 to 1960, a feast day called "The Circumcision of the Lord and the Octave of the Nativity"? It is now the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God, and the Octave Day of the Nativity of the Lord. The feast day arises from Luke 2:21, "And at the end of eight days, when he was circumcised, he was called Jesus, the name given by the angel before he was conceived in the womb."

Our Namesake: Hero or Villain?



We live in a crazy world. Those in power tend to listen to those that scream the loudest, like a child throwing a temper tantrum until the parents give it whatever it wants just to get it to stop. That never works out well, not for the parents, not for the child and not for those around them. The **'woke movement'** [ed.: a social and political movement that seeks to address and correct social injustices, inequality, and discrimination. It emphasizes recognizing and challenging systemic issues, like racism, sexism, and other forms of oppression. In mainstream use, woke can also more generally describe someone or something as being 'with it'.] reminds me of that child having a fit. Sadly, the powers that be are the parents giving in to the screaming and wailing. So, what gives these protesters so much power? In a word: Racism. Politicians are so afraid of being called a racist they'll do anything to avoid offending anyone. Protesters, knowing this, call anyone who disagrees with them a racist. The upshot of this is that while a small percentage of the population is now in control, it has no idea what it's talking about and instead regurgitates rhetoric they find on social media sites. Names like Sir John A MacDonald, Ryerson and Dundas have been removed from places of learning and streets. To say nothing about our namesake, Christopher Columbus. When once generally commemorated as a hero, founder of the Americas, great explorer and master of the waves, he is now increasingly portrayed as a villain, slave trader, rapist and responsible for genocide.

I just about drove into a ditch one day as I was driving along listening CBC on the radio. A man by the name of Sean French was being interviewed. Mr. French lives in Montreal and wants a 100 km road called Columbus Ave to be renamed. He's been on this crusade since 2019 and has gathered a lot of support. In 2022, an indigenous group threw their weight behind him as they claimed Columbus' legacy was one of genocide of the native people of the Americas. The government hasn't changed the name yet ... not because of their love of Columbus but for financial reasons (changing a street name would cost millions and they don't have it in their current budget to do so).

I can give you a few other examples of what has happened to the name of Christopher Columbus in recent years. After 110 years, the city of Detroit removed a bust of Columbus and put it in storage in an undisclosed location. In 2022, in Richmond Virginia, a statue of Columbus was torn down, set on fire and thrown in a lake. In the same year, the state of California removed a statue from the capitol rotunda. In Philadelphia, a statue was encased in a plywood frame to hide it from public view. Rhode Island has removed all statues and likenesses of Columbus from public places. In all, 33 statues of Columbus have been removed from public view in the past 8 years. What about here in Canada? Well, an individual by the name of Jago wants the province of British Columbia to change its name to S'ólh Téméxw ('our land'), pronounced "soul tow-mock". And what about us, the members of the Order of the Knights of Columbus? Surely, I thought, no one would think an organization such as ours, that does so much good around the world, an organization that feeds, clothes and shelters the needy should distance itself from its namesake. Surely everyone can see we stand for all that is good, that we do our utmost to follow the teachings of Christ. I was wrong. Since 2018, a petition has circulated calling for us to change our name and not only to drop the name of Columbus but the word "Knight" as well because of its connection to war and the crusades. When our past Supreme Knight Carl Anderson was asked for his view, he side-stepped by not endorsing the name change but not condemning it either.

Why all this anger? Who was Christopher Columbus and what did he actually do? I thought over the next few months I would try to untangle fact from fiction and present to you who he was, what he did and why. We must also look at the times he lived in to gauge if he went outside the socially-accepted behavior of his time.

Christopher Columbus was born sometime between the end of August and the end of October in 1451. He was from the Republic of Genoa. The first time he went to sea he was 14 years of age. He traveled as far north as the British Isles and as far south as Ghana. He married well above his class by wedding a Portuguese noblewoman named Filipa Moniz Perestrelo, with whom he had a son named Diego. Largely self-educated, he was an avid reader and studied geography, astronomy and history. Many of his books still exist and he had the nasty habit of writing his thoughts in the margins.

During his lifetime and under the Mongol empire created by Genghis Khan, the 'spice road' came into existence bringing spices, silks and other treasure to Europe from China, India and the Middle East. When the Ottomans

conquered Constantinople, the gateway to Europe for the spice road was lost and the only way to get the riches of the East was to sail around the extremely dangerous Cape of Good Hope at the southern tip of Africa. Columbus, knowing the earth was round, believed that if one sailed west, one would eventually end up in the east.

What motivated Columbus to find an alternative route to the riches of the East? Columbus was a Christian Apocalyptic, meaning he thought he was living in the end times, that Christ would soon return to earth and bring about His Kingdom. Accordingly, Columbus would have thought that if he could find an easier route to the East, he could make a vast fortune from that monopoly and use it to sponsor a crusade to capture the Holy Sepulcher. In doing so, he would fulfil a Biblical prophecy, see Christ return to earth and gain great favour in the eyes of God. This fact is rarely talked about. In fact, I had no idea until I started researching our namesake for this article. He also wanted to convert every race he encountered to Christianity - this is where people today take issue with his actions.

I won't go into detail about him seeking financial backing for his ideas as I'm sure most of you know he approached King Ferdinand III and Queen Isabella I to fund his expedition. In return for him undertaking this expedition, the Spanish Crown would grant him 10 percent of all revenue generated from trade in the new lands acquired by Spain. This would indeed be a vast fortune. Columbus set sail from Castile in August 1492 with 3 ships. He made landfall on October 12th of the same year at what we now call the Bahamas. He then visited Cuba, Hispaniola and eventually established a colony on Haiti. He returned to Castile in 1493 with a group of captured natives and word of his success quickly spread all across Europe. Columbus would make three more voyages landing in and about the Lesser Antilles and Trinidad in 1493, the northern coast of South America in 1498, and Central America 1502. Columbus is responsible for the term "Indian", for Indigenous people, as he firmly believed he had reached the far East and India. Columbus took to heart the powers he was granted and felt himself supreme ruler of all the peoples he conquered. This 'ego-centric' view is again what leads people of today to question his hero status.

Next month, I'll write about my view of a series of Columbus' incredible accomplishments, as well as his shortcomings and eventual downfall as even in his day he had many detractors. I think it is also important for us to acknowledge the norms of his day, the attitudes of his time. Indeed, a great deal of 'negative press' was spread about Columbus in his own life by others who wanted to horn in on the vast number of monies being earned by the discovery of the New World. I'll try and sort through all of that to find the truth so that, hopefully, we will all have a greater understanding of who Christopher Columbus was, his accomplishments and his mistakes. Then, when someone asks "Why do you keep the name of Columbus?", you can reply, "Well, sit down and let me tell you."

Reflection

Pondering what to write about this month, as we begin a new year, 'F' words danced in my head. Calm down ... I mean these ones: **Forget, Forgive, Foster** and **Forgo** ... and how they are interrelated.

Let's start with reminding ourselves we're all susceptible to forgetfulness. While for many the capacity to remember things diminishes with age and some do experience the tragic descent into dementia which erases memories (even the capacity to capture new ones), it's not uncommon (if not embarrassing) to benefit from an occasional reminder. It would be fair to observe that much forgetfulness can be attributed to neglectfulness ... forgetting to mark things down on the calendar or paying attention when introduced to someone for the first time or simply hearing rather than listening when prompted to do something. There are, unfortunately, things we decide to not **forget** ... to carry around even as they grow stale and often become toxic to poison our minds. While well-intentioned family and friends will often suggest the remedy is to simply "**Forget about it**" / "**Let it go**" / "**Get over it**" ... the real cure to reconciling the unforgettable is to **forgive**.

Forgiveness is charity and occurs by the elimination of a debt owed, especially when done without reciprocation (i.e., apology / compensation / atonement). Contrary to the adage, "**To forgive is to forget**", it is the better person that can forgive while remembering but then not retaliating to seek revenge or return the hurt caused by another. As Catholics we understand **charity** is synonymous with **love** and so, when we forgive, we demonstrate love for another.

Our parish mission calls us to "**go make disciples**" through words and deeds that **foster** peace and unity "**to bring healing to a wounded world**". We foster by encouraging or promoting the development of growth in our personal and shared relationships with God and the Church. Fostering is a positive action that seeks to construct discipleship in oneself and in others. It is, therefore, an essential duty of Knights.

To **forgo** is also charity expressed as making sacrifice that others may benefit. To forgo the need for apology as a cost of forgiveness is such an example. The key lessons from Jesus' **Sermon on the Mount** (as listed in my study Bible) tell us the **things we should strive to forgo**:

- **pride and personal independence** (*blessed are the poor in spirit*),
- **happiness at any cost** (*blessed are those that mourn*),
- **power** (*blessed are the meek*),
- **pursuit of personal needs** (*blessed are those that hunger and thirst for righteousness*),
- **strength without feeling** (*blessed are the merciful*),
- **making deception acceptable** (*blessed are the pure in heart*),
- **concern for the world's chaos when pursuing personal peace** (*blessed are the peacemakers*),
- **weak commitments** (*blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness*).

As we venture into the new year, let us not forget to forgive unconditionally as we foster greater peace and unity by forgoing the many things that may distract us from our mission as Knights. When we **forgive**, **foster** and **forgo**, we love ... don't **forget** that.


