

**Father Ernie Deslippe** (1929 - 2011) served as Council chaplain for over 46 years. He was born in Harrow Ontario on March 20, 1929 and was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop John C. Cody on May 27, 1961 at St. Peter's Basilica, London Ontario. He celebrated his first Mass at St. Anthony of Padua parish in Harrow. Through his 50 years of ordained ministry, he served as associate pastor, Holy Angels' Parish, St. Thomas; and Administrator, St. Joseph Mission, Port Stanley. He was an inspiring priest, a leader with fortitude. Throughout his life he was a comforting power for disadvantaged people helping them to find a clear path to follow. He was a dedicated member of the Knights of Columbus who stressed that prayer is a vital tool. It helps to become confident, to see things in proper perspective, to give us vision, courage, strength and endurance, and to erode our impure motives.

He said holiness is not something we do for ourselves and instead something that God does in us. He invited us to open our hands to allow what we have to be shared, to flow out of us and we watch it multiplied. He understood that giving, not getting, is the generosity begets generosity. He pointed out that paying attention is one of the greatest compliments we can pay to another human being. Father Deslippe exemplified the mission of the Church to guide its followers to a fulfilling life. He was a great spiritual leader dedicated to prayer and always striving for virtue. Fr. Ernie was a strong advocate of learning and so Council awards a \$1000 scholarship in his name each year to a student that demonstrates the values and principles of the Gospel and is pursuing post-secondary education.

The Knights of Columbus (K of C) is a fraternal benefit society that was established in 1882 thanks to the efforts of **Blessed Father Michael J. McGivney**, assistant pastor of St. Mary's Church in New Haven, Connecticut. 


Dinner proceeds to benefit local community charities.

## PASTORAL MESSAGE: We are the Wheat... Christ is the Bread

It has been more than one year since I arrived here in this family of parishes and I am still finding new groups and ministries at work in our parish and in the community. There are of course the many liturgical ministries and sacramental ministries which are at the heart of our community, yet there are so many others reaching out to our parish, community and the world. There is so much good being done by so many in our parish of families. We need to celebrate and cultivate what is being done. Fundamentally, this call to service arises out of our baptismal call to holiness which drives us to know, love and serve the Lord in all things. This service is different than just activism or altruism.

**Activism** and **altruism** are driven by a cause or perceived need as defined by the giver and not the one in need. In times of emergency, this basic tendency to help is good yet ministry and Christian charity is something greater. **Ministry** is driven by the love of God and the desire to serve Him in others. It starts from a place of prayer that seeks to contemplate His Presence and His Grace already at work in the world. It demands a gift of self, given freely for the good of another, and in humility we discover this small gift bears fruit in us and in the world.

While the Catholic Church is the largest charitable organization in the world, the Church is in essence best described as "**a Holy Exchange of Gifts**". Each Sunday we place our small acts of service on the altar of the Lord, bound to the one sacrifice of Christ. From the altar, we receive Christ's true presence and are sent forth. As Ignatius of Antioch said, "**We are the wheat... Christ is the bread**".

## A Soldier of the Great War's Diary

As most of you know by now, I'm a military historian and often have folks show up at my doorstep with articles of clothing, badges, or medals for me to identify or to tell them where the items belong. A while back, a family from West Lorne brought me a WWI diary kept by a young man who ended up being their Great Grandfather. It is incredibly detailed and very insightful for such a young man that was experiencing the horrors of war so far from home for the very first time. I'd like to quote passages from his diary that hopefully, as Remembrance Day is upon us, give you pause to reflect upon during the traditional 2 minutes of silence we observe on that day.

*"As for myself, during nearly three years in the army, two years away from Canada and 13 months in this land, I have never lost sight of the reason for my enlistment. After going through some of the most remarkable experiences possible for a man, I am still firm in the belief that the Hun must be beaten if I am to be free of military service for the rest of my days and if future generations are to have what I expected in life. This must be done if it takes every fit man in the country or the world."*

That says it all in my thinking. I'd ask you to imagine a kid of 21, sitting in a hole full of mud, rats and covered in vermin, writing exactly what many came to understand: that the war had to be fought, that the country of aggression (Germany) had to be stopped lest the Kaiser impose his view of the world on everyone. Perhaps some of you think, "No war should be fought". If so, believe me, I would love to think while that's possible, sometimes a tyrant comes along who will just not listen to reason and, oftentimes, captivates a nation's young men to stand against him.

Historically-speaking, the causation of WWI (The Great War) is murky. Many will blame it on the assassination of the **Austrian Archduke Ferdinand** and his wife in Sarajevo. The fuse had been lit long before that unfortunate moment, in a place no one could find on a map, which was to become the proverbial gasoline puddle that set the world ablaze. Regardless, our diarist was saying what **Col. John McCrae** would say in his famous poem: that it had to be done, and if it wasn't completed then someone else, namely future generations, would have to pick up the torch and continue on. Sadly, some 20 years later that is exactly what happened with the advent of WW2. I'd also like to point out that all through the diary he always referred to the Germans as 'Hun', 'Fritz' or 'Heinie' since this was done (and still is) to dehumanize the enemy. This helped men killing one another to not think the man on the receiving end of the bullet he's just fired as someone like Robert Smith, the guy who lives down the block from me. In the Second World War the enemy was referred to as the Nazi and while indeed they were, the problem was that only a small percentage of the German armed forces at that time were members of **The National Socialist German Workers' Party**, the political party known as the 'Nazis'.

The next passages give us a view into the staggering loss of life that occurred. *"Next morning we were ordered up to go in to reinforce the 10th Brigade. We met up with the 44th Battalion coming out as we were going in. They had 95 guys left out of the 500 that went in. They were a worn-out looking bunch."* So, over 400 dead from one Battalion and just in a matter of days which is mind-numbing and almost impossible to comprehend. Canada lost close to 64,000 men in WWI and almost 45,000 in WWII. We weren't a very large country at that time and, as I've said before, entire communities lost every man over the age of 12 and under 60 - a generation lost but hopefully not forgotten. This next statement shows how war changes one's perceptive on life and his fellow man, *"A wagon was hit a few yards from me. The two drivers were killed instantly but the poor horse was horribly wounded and it lied there in a pool of mud and blood staring at me with sad eyes as if to say 'What's this all about?' I whimpered and cried for that dying horse but not for the drivers, hmm strange."* While men being killed became so commonplace in the field that it stopped causing a reaction, an animal being killed made men cry.

Further along he wrote, *"We decided to do a little reconnoitering to see if we could find material to improve our little dugout. 50 yards from us we found a German machine gun post. The smell was horrific from bodies which had been buried and then torn up by shells. Others just laid where they had fallen at the door of the machine gun post sprawled out black and bloated. The sight would turn your stomach had we all not grown accustomed to seeing such sights. It seems cruel but we made jokes and said rude remarks about these grey-clad men. But one must make jokes knowing that an hour from now we could all be in the same situation."*

Let us all pray daily that our children and our children's children never have to be put in a situation where death and destruction of their fellow man becomes commonplace. Let us pray that world leaders will listen to reason and find peaceful solutions to conflicts. I pray that all of you on **November 11<sup>th</sup>**, at **1100 hours**, stop what you're doing and stand in silence for 2 minutes as you remember all of the young men who gave their lives for our freedom.

We have grown too complacent in our lives and sadly many youth today don't learn a great deal about the wars that gave them the right to do whatever and whoever they want to be. As Knights, we must set examples for those around us by stopping and standing proud as we commemorate a generation before us that gave their everything for our tomorrow. Remember then our young diarist and the thousands like him for if their deeds and sacrifice are remembered then they didn't die in vain. Peace my brothers.

# Reflection

While reflecting upon the theme of this month's article, *Remembrance*, four key passages of scripture came to mind ... three 'happy' and one less so:



- **Luke 22:19:** And he took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."
- **Acts 20:35:** In all things I have shown you that by so toiling one must help the weak, remembering the words of the Lord Jesus, how he said, 'It is more blessed to give than to receive.'
- **John 14:25-26:** "These things I have spoken to you, while I am still with you. But the Counselor, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, he will teach you all things, and bring to your remembrance all that I have said to you."
- **Genesis 3:19:** "In the sweat of your face you shall eat bread till you return to the ground, for out of it you were taken; you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

The first, as we know, is the foundation of our faith: To assemble regularly for the purpose of celebrating Holy Communion. The second underpins the existence of our Order and especially the mission of Council membership: To perform acts of charity. The third calls us to appreciate the Holy Spirit, the Paraclete, who reminds us daily to vigilantly keep at least the 'pilot-light' of hope, faith and love burning in each of us. As John tells us, the Holy Spirit will also urge us to constantly improve our understanding of the Gospel so that we may, in turn, share it with others as we give witness to the Word through our actions.

Which brings me to the fourth; God's 'reality check' for all of us mere mortal sinners. To paraphrase: **You will work hard all your life to earn your daily bread (be it mere crumbs or a bakery full of loaves) and then die.** Ah, Death: The 'great 'equalizer', he who awaits us at the 'departure gate' to the after-life, where all life's journeys eventually converge and where (lest we forget) there's no opportunity to arrange carry-on or checked baggage for our final trip. Given, then, that you can't take it with you, let's talk about '**Giving Tuesday**'.

First, what is it? "*The world's largest generosity movement ... whether it's making someone smile, helping a stranger, or giving to those who need our help, every act of generosity counts, and everyone has something to give*" (<https://www.givingtuesday.ca/about>). It occurs **December 3<sup>rd</sup>** this year ... yes, on a Tuesday. And how does Giving Tuesday relate to the scripture passages I've listed above? Well, it gives us the opportunity to contribute to meeting Jesus' 2<sup>nd</sup> Great Commandment: "**You shall love your neighbor as yourself**" (Matthew 22:39; Mark 12:31). So, as Giving Tuesday will soon be upon us, I encourage you to consider making a private and personal financial donation to a local charity.
