Father Ernie Deslippe (1929 - 2011) served as Council chaplain for over 46 years. He was born in Harrow Ontario on March 20, 1929 and was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop John C. Cody on May 27, 1961 at St. Peter's Basilica, London Ontario. He celebrated his first Mass at St. Anthony of Padua parish in Harrow. Through his 50 years of ordained ministry, he served as associate pastor, Holy Angels' Parish, St. Thomas; and Administrator, St. Joseph Mission, Port Stanley. He was an inspiring priest, a leader with fortitude. Throughout his life he was a comforting power for disadvantaged people helping them to find a clear path to follow. He was a dedicated member of the Knights of Columbus who stressed that prayer is a vital tool. It helps to become confident, to see things in proper perspective, to give us vision, courage, strength and endurance, and to erode our impure motives.

He said holiness is not something we do for ourselves and instead something that God does in us. He invited us to open our hands to allow what we have to be shared, to flow out of us and we watch it multiplied. He understood that giving, not getting, is the generosity begets generosity. He pointed out that paying attention is one of the greatest compliments we can pay to another human being. Father Deslippe exemplified the mission of the Church to guide its followers to a fulfilling life. He was a great spiritual leader dedicated to prayer and always striving for virtue. Fr. Ernie was a strong advocate of learning and so Council awards a \$1000 scholarship in his name each year to a student that demonstrates the values and principles of the Gospel and is pursuing post-secondary education.

The Knights of Columbus (K of C) is a fraternal benefit society that was established in 1882 thanks to the efforts of **Blessed Father Michael J. McGivney**, assistant pastor of St. Mary's Church in New Haven, Connecticut. Pope Francis, may he rest in peace

It is with a very heavy heart that we acknowledge the passing of Pope Francis. Let us look briefly at his life and time as the one who occupied the seat of St. Peter. Pope Francis, born **Jorge Mario Bergoglio** on December 17, 1936, in Buenos Aires, Argentina, rose from humble beginnings to become one of the most influential spiritual leaders of the 21st century. As the first pope from the Americas and the first Jesuit pope, he brought a fresh perspective to the papacy when he was elected in 2013. Known for his commitment to simplicity, humility, and social justice, Francis emphasized a Church that served the poor and marginalized. His early years as Archbishop of Buenos Aires reflected a pastoral approach centered on compassion and service, values he carried into his papal ministry. Throughout his pontificate, Pope Francis worked tirelessly to address major global issues such as climate change, refugee crises, and economic inequality. Holy Angels Restoration Update

As of publication of this month's issue, **Holy Angels' debt stands at \$0**. That's right brothers, the debt at Holy Angels has been paid off. What an amazing accomplishment considering where the debt sat just a few short months ago. The debt is gone and now we can start raising funds to cover much needed repairs. Although not the top of the building committee's list, almost every parishioner I speak with wants the front steps repaired. I guess its that feeling you get after Mass when you exit the church through those big doors and down the steps carrying the light of the Lord into a world filled with darkness. So, we all still need to donate to Holy Angels, and above and beyond what goes towards operating costs. Which brings me to the topic of pledge forms.

One aspect of donating that hasn't been addressed is the pledge form. Completing a pledge form allows you to give a larger sum by spreading a donation in increments over five years. The form also allows you to budget your donation by providing a void cheque and checking off when you want funds withdrawn monthly, quarterly or annually. Pledge forms are available at the church office and will be available at the back of the Holy Angels in the coming weeks.

You might also consider the **Holy Angels Restoration Fund** in your estate planning. This can be accomplished with a simple call to your estate lawyer and asking them to add "Holy Angels Restoration Fund" into the shares portion of your estate. If you choose this option, please be sure to **specify the restoration fund** otherwise the shares will be directed to the general functioning of the church (which is also important so, if possible, list both).

Previous generations of Catholics looked after Holy Angels to ensure that we would have a place of glory to worship our Lord, the torch has been passed to us. Let us not extinguish it.

But for the grace of God ...

A very smart friend of mine always tells me “*to compare is to despair*”, meaning you can’t compare one situation to another. I’ll give you a great comparison. I am the youngest of six children. After coming home from World War II, my father started what would become a very successful construction company. My Mother stayed home to raise all of us but when I started high school, and not needing to be looked after as much, she decided she would also go into business. She purchased two variety stores, one in St Thomas and one in Port Stanley. Where am I going with this tale? Well, I can tell you that never in my life did I ever know the word “*want*”. I had everything I ever wanted, including the best of clothes and always a brand-new pair of Converse high-top running shoes. When I wanted to start playing guitar, my parents bought me a Gibson Les Paul and a Marshal amp. So, taking all of that into consideration, would it make much sense for me to compare my life growing up to others? When I was a young kid, I did, and assumed that everyone else of my age couldn’t get within ten feet of the tree on Christmas morning because of the pile of presents. Until I started going over to school chums’ houses after school, I thought everyone ate a three-course meal every night for dinner. I certainly was shocked to know that not only did not everyone live like I did, most did not.

I learned that lesson at a very young age. I also came to appreciate that I was blessed not only because we were wealthy but that I had a mom and dad that loved all of us and each other. I was especially blessed that my dad, having been a WWII fighter pilot, wasn’t an alcoholic or abusive even though he did suffer from what we now call PTSD. I was indeed blessed and continue to be as I have done my best (tried to anyway) to help those less fortunate than myself, to help those who didn’t have the benefit of growing up in a loving family that taught the value of a hard day’s work. Truth be told, that is why I became a Knight ... it provided another way that I could help our less fortunate brothers and sisters.

Let’s take a look at how some folks in our community are forced to live. The maximum amount individuals relying on the **Ontario Works** program (welfare) receives each month is \$733.00. From that, they are required to pay rent, clothe themselves, and buy food. Considering the average rent in St. Thomas for a one-bedroom apartment is \$1706.00 per month, those individuals start off about \$1000 short right out of the gate. Three people would have to rent that one-bedroom apartment (and sleep in shifts). I did an online search and found a one-bedroom apartment in St. Thomas for \$1,525.00 and its location and condition was scary. A family of three (mom, dad and one child) on Ontario Works receives \$1,877.00 per month. Renting that one-bedroom apartment I spoke of would leave them about \$100 for the month to buy groceries and other essentials.

Perhaps you’re thinking, “**Why are they on welfare in the first place? Can’t they get a job and become self-sufficient?**” Well, it’s often due to a ‘chain effect’, like if your dad was a farmer chances are you’d become a farmer. I became a stone mason because that’s what my dad was and I liked hanging out with him. The point is that your parents either taught you to succeed them in the ‘family business’ or encouraged you to go to school and study to enter a profession. The statistics on children growing up on social assistance ending up on it as adults is staggering. It’s what they know and what they were ‘taught’. Some make it out but sadly most do not.

Why would a parent on Ontario Works send their child to St. Joseph’s high school? Remember I told you about those expensive running shoes and clothing I had? Children and especially adolescents can be mean and cruel. A teenager that isn’t dressed the way their peer group deems acceptable is likely to be picked on. At Catholic high schools, however, the students are obligated to a specific dress code, they wear a uniform and so it doesn’t matter if their parents are rich or poor. St. Joe’s even has an abundance of school uniforms that are turned in when they are outgrown or when students graduate. When Seamus finished high school, we took two garbage bags full of school clothing to the office and handed them over so that a less fortunate child could dress in the school attire free of charge. It’s actually very heartwarming to know how many parents do this every year.

What did our Lord Jesus Christ have to say about comparing yourselves to others? While He never actually used the words, “*Don’t compare yourselves to others*”, He did emphasize the dangers of comparing. He did

discourage self-measure and prideful comparisons with others on several occasions and here are a couple of examples:

- ***"We do not dare to classify or compare ourselves with some who command themselves; when they measure themselves and compare themselves with themselves, they are not wise."*** (2 Corinthians 10:12)
- ***"For by the grace given to me, I tell each of you not to regard yourselves more highly than you ought, but rather to think of yourselves with sober judgment, each in proportion with the faith that God has allotted."*** (Romans 12:3)

There are others that space does not allow me to include but I encourage you look up Galatians 2:21 and Proverbs 26:12. They too invite believers to focus on their own relationships with God and to avoid the pitfall of comparison which can and does lead to envy, pride and a lack of grace.

My hope is that upon reading this you will come to see that the Knights' supporting programs, such as the breakfast and snack programs at our grade schools and high school, is a necessity. I can guarantee you that without them kids will go hungry. I remember speaking to one student at St. Joe's a few years back and as the school year was coming to a close. I asked him if he was looking forward to having the summer off. Unlike most kids, he was not ... because he was facing 2 months of going hungry! Sadly, I've learned hunger is not just a 'third world' problem and actually never was. While I can't fathom that in a country such as ours that kids are going hungry, I know they are. If doing the groceries isn't one of your household chores, you should tag along sometime when you'll see loaves of bread costing \$9, butter \$8, a dozen eggs \$6, and milk \$7 for 4 liters. Then ask yourself: ***"How far could I make that \$100 go?"***

Reflection

The ongoing international tariffs drama, 'orchestrated' by the US President and featuring stock market melt-downs (at least at the time of this writing), got me to looking for something humorous to take the edge off the anxiety many folks are reportedly experiencing. Stop me if you've heard this one (many variations exist):

Three pastors from different parishes are discussing what they do with their offertory collections and other donations. The first says, *"I draw a circle on the floor, throw the money up in the air, and whatever lands in the circle I give to God and whatever lands outside the circle I keep"*. The second says, *"I do pretty much the same but I give whatever lands outside the circle to God"*. The third says, *"Brothers, I keep things simple and while I also throw all the money up in the air, I have faith that whatever God wants He'll keep."*

For those of you much less inclined to heresy, I suppose one can make a case that the latter 'joke' arises from Jesus' own 'blue chip' financial advice, ***"Render therefore to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's"*** (Matthew 22:21; Mark 12:17; Luke 20:25). We can safely assume and be confident He knew the only treasure His Father valued was human offerings of ***faith, hope and charity***.

As regards the current currency dramas, the proverbial 'they' say it's best to simply ride things out and not make rash personal financial decisions when things are so fluid / dynamic / crazy / uncertain. Indeed, it gives a whole new perspective on a Beatitude: *Blessed are the poor ... they have a lot less to worry about having not much to begin with*. And yet, how fortuitous that we now find ourselves in May, the month dedicated to Mary, our Mother. As we know, her privileged position in Heaven allows her to advocate on our behalf ... to intercede that God may hear our petitions. One of the best ways to send her our petitions is to 'enclose' them in the following prayer 'envelope':

MEMORAE: Remember, O most gracious Virgin Mary that never was it known that anyone who fled to thy protection implored thy help, or sought thy intercession was left unaided. Inspired by this confidence, I fly unto thee, O Virgin of virgins, my Mother. To thee do I come, before thee I stand, sinful and sorrowful. O Mother of the Word Incarnate despise not my petitions but, in thy mercy, hear and answer me. Amen.

During May, I call on you and our fellow brothers to reflect on a defining characteristic of our Order: **deep devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of Jesus**. We all received a rosary when we joined and were encouraged to turn to Mary as our own Mother, so that she may lead each of us closer to her Son. We have long expressed filial devotion to Mary under various titles, especially **Our Lady of Guadalupe**, patroness of the Americas and of the Philippines, and the **Immaculate Conception**. Let each of us make a special effort this month to demonstrate special reverence for Our Lady through prayer and acts of charity. In particular, I ask you to please take heed of Brother Regis' invitation to join a growing list of brothers that receive the weekly email calling us to a virtual (Zoom) meeting each Tuesday at 1 p.m. to say the Rosary together.
